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4	Resolution offered by the Supervisors of the Public Works Committee and Commission on
5	Aging
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7	Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Oneida County, Wisconsin:
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9	WHEREAS, local government in Wisconsin is responsible for about 90% of the road
10	miles in the state; and
11	WHEREAS, Wisconsin's diverse economy is dependent upon county and town roads as
12	well as city and village streets and transit systems across the state; and
13	WHEREAS, according to "Filling Potholes: A New Look at Funding Local Transportation
14	in Wisconsin," commissioned by the Local Government Institute of Wisconsin (LGI) the
15	condition of Wisconsin's highways is now in the bottom third of the country; and
16	WHEREAS, state funding for local roads, transit systems and elderly & disabled
17	transportation programs in Wisconsin has failed to keep up with costs over the past several
18	decades which has adversely affected local transportation finances. According to "Filling
19	Potholes," municipal transportation spending has declined from \$275 per capita in 2000 to \$227
20	in 2012; and
21	WHEREAS, Mass Transit Operating Aids and County Elderly and Disabled
22	Transportation assistance programs are funded through the state gas tax and vehicle
23	registration user fee system. These programs are critical to ensuring that transportation services
24	are delivered to vulnerable citizens. Proper funding for these programs helps ensure that all
25	citizens have an opportunity to access the workplace as well as the marketplace; and
26	WHEREAS, levy limits do not allow local government to make up for the deterioration of
27	state funding; and
28	WHEREAS, Wisconsin's over-reliance on borrowing eats away at the state's segregated
29	funding sources – the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees – which increasingly pay debt
30	service rather than fund transportation needs; and
31	WHEREAS, safety is a primary concern and responsibility of local governments across
32	Wisconsin. Unfortunately, according to TRIP, a national non-profit transportation research
33	group, Wisconsin had 347 non-interstate, rural road fatalities in 2013; and
34	WHEREAS, the Oneida County board/ council recognizes that our state highway and
35	interstate system is the backbone of our surface transportation system and plays a vital role in
36	the economy of Wisconsin. Both local and state roads need to be properly maintained in order
37	for our economy to grow; and
38	WHEREAS, from a competitive standpoint Wisconsin motorists pay significantly less
39	than any of our neighbors when you combine the annual cost of the state gas tax and vehicle
40	registration fees; and
41	WHEREAS, the Transportation Finance and Policy Commission, appointed by the
42	Governor and Legislature clearly found that if Wisconsin does not adjust its user fees, the
43	condition of both our state and local roads and transit systems will deteriorate significantly over
44	the next decade.
45	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Oneida County Board of Supervisors
46	that the Board urges the Governor and Legislature to Just Fix It and agree upon a sustainable
47	solution: one that includes a responsible level of bonding and adjusts our user fees to
48	adequately and sustainably fund Wisconsin's transportation system.
49	BÉ IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board of Supervisors directs the Clerk to
50	send a copy of this resolution to our State Legislators and to Governor Scott Walker.
