Postponed Resolution #65-2010 - offered by Supervisors of the Forestry, Land & Outdoor

Recreation Committee regarding the Countywide Route and Trail Plan Update.

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Health Department sponsored the original 2002 Oneida County Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan as part of its statutory requirement to assess and plan for community health needs; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Board of Supervisors adopted the *Oneida County Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan* with the passing of Resolution # 117-2002; and

WHEREAS, the above described planning effort resulted in the formation of the Oneida County Biking and Walking Trails Council (OCBWTC), a private, not-for-profit organization with the overarching goal of making Oneida County more walk-able and bike-able; and

WHEREAS, to better facilitate the development of pedestrian and bicycle facilities in Oneida County, the Oneida County Biking and Walking Trails Council determined that the 2002 Oneida County Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan required updating; and

WHEREAS, the recent planning efforts of the Oneida County Biking and Walking Trails Council has resulted in the attached *Countywide Route and Trail Plan Update*; and

WHEREAS, the *Countywide Route and Trail Plan Update* provides both conceptual, and specific plans for the development of a network of walking and biking trails throughout Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of this plan does not commit Oneida County to funding the development or maintenance of the proposed network of walking and biking trails; however, success in obtaining grant money for trail development projects is highly dependent on a trail being included in a County approved plan; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Board of Supervisors adopted the 2009—2013 Oneida County Outdoor Recreation Plan in April of 2009 with the understanding that updates could be made to the plan; and

WHEREAS, the 2009—2013 Oneida County Outdoor Recreation Plan will be more comprehensive by the inclusion of the Countywide Route and Trail Plan Update; so

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida County Board of Supervisors hereby adopts the *Countywide Route and Trail Plan Update* and amends the *2009—2013 Oneida County Outdoor Recreation Plan* to include the aforementioned Trail Plan Update; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the amendment to the 2009—2013 Oneida County Recreation Plan be forwarded to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for certification. WHEREAS, Oneida County has over 1300 lakes, rivers, and streams, and contains one of the highest concentrations of natural lakes in the world, and

WHEREAS, the quality of these waters is being threatened by aquatic invasive species; and

WHEREAS, Oneida County recognizes the importance of the quality of our waters to its citizens and local economies, and

WHEREAS, education is one of the keys to increasing public awareness as to the adverse impacts of aquatic invasive species on the quality of our waters and our local economies; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the LWCD is authorized to apply for 75% funding assistance for such programming under the "Aquatic Invasive Species" Grant Program from the WDNR.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Oneida County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Chairman of the Agriculture & Extension Education/Land & Water Conservation Committee, to submit an application for a one-year grant to the WDNR not to exceed \$34,000.00 in grant funds for an aquatic invasive species education, planning, and prevention program, to sign documents and take the necessary action to undertake, direct, and complete the approved aquatic invasive species control grant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the LWCD is authorized to meet the County's 25% share of the financial obligations of this aquatic invasive species grant, through the assignment of LWCD personnel to work on and complete the project, including timely publication of the results. WHEREAS, the lakes and rivers of Oneida County are the County's single most important and valuable resource; and

WHEREAS, the waters of Oneida County are the economic engine that generates a majority of revenues for the County; and

WHEREAS, the waters of Oneida County directly and indirectly account for substantial revenue and employment throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, it is in the County's long-term best interest to protect and preserve these premier assets to the maximum degree practicable; and

WHEREAS, the Agricultural & Extension Education/Land & Water Conservation Committee is responsible for protecting and preserving the waters of Oneida County; and

WHEREAS, the County will be required to have a new shoreland protection zoning ordinance intended to protect and preserve the waters of the County in place before February 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that the revision process be afforded maximum public transparency and input from the stakeholders in the welfare and protection of Oneida County's waters: and

WHEREAS, the necessary public transparency and input cannot be achieved within the available timeframe by the County's already overburdened Planning & Zoning Committee and Department; and

WHEREAS, a proposed Shoreland Resources Advisory Committee (SRAC) would be made up of unpaid volunteers and thus will have no financial impact on the County; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida County Lakes and Rivers Association (OCLRA) has agreed to reimburse the County for the per diem expenses incurred by a County Supervisor who is a member of the SRAC: and

WHEREAS, funds are available from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) to help finance the development of the required revisions to shoreland protection ordinances.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors appoint a Shoreland Resources Advisory Committee (SRAC) to be made up of unpaid volunteers, not to exceed nine in number, representing the principal stakeholders in the welfare and protection of Oneida County's waters. Such stakeholders to include riparian owners and residents, lake and river associations and districts, user groups, realtors, builder/developers, logging and farming interests and commercial entities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the purpose of the SRAC will be to:

- A. Identify the desirable and appropriate changes to the County's Shoreland Protection Ordinance consistent with the State's Shoreland Protection Program based on input from the various stakeholders
- B. Provide an independent evaluation of the ordinance provisions required to best protect the invaluable water resources of Oneida County.
- C. Make specific recommendations to the Agriculture & Extension Education/Land & Water Conservation Committee to identify those provisions that must be included in the County's revised Shoreland Protection Ordinance in order to best protect the waters of Oneida County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such SRAC be formed as quickly as practicable and include at least one member of the Agricultural & Extension Education/Land & Water Conservation Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such SRAC avail itself of the services of the University of Wisconsin - Stevens Point's Center for Lake Use Education (CLUE); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such SRAC coordinate with and report its activities, findings and recommendations to the Agricultural & Extension/Land & Water Conservation Committee on at least a monthly basis for purposes of the Agricultural & Extension/Land & Water Conservation Committee reporting those recommendations of the SRAC with which the Committee concurs to the County Board of Supervisors for approval by the Board of Supervisors for inclusion into the final Shoreland Protection Ordinance revisions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such SRAC complete its work and furnish its final recommendations to the Agricultural & Extension Education/Land & Water Conservation Committee not later than September 30, 2011; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Planning & Zoning Department be directed to apply for any and all grant funding available from the WDNR as soon as practicable in order to help finance the changes that will be required to revise and implement the County's Shoreland Protection Ordinance. Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the

remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 2.44 of the General Code of Oneida County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

2.44 AGRICULTURE AND EXTENSION EDUCATION/LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION COMMITTEE. (Am. Res. #86-2009)

This Committee shall:

- (1) Act as the County Agriculture and Extension Education/Land and Water Conservation Committee with such powers and duties as prescribed in Ch. 59.56(3), Wis. Stats., as amended from time to time.
- (2) Act as the County appointed Committee to process Lake District petitions and conduct the public hearing required by Wis. Stat. s. 33.26(1).

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Department currently does not have a fee associated with the submittal and review of "At-Risk" septic systems and propose a \$410.00 review fee; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Committee has reviewed the proposed fee and recommends that the fee schedule be changed to include a fee for the review of "At-Risk" septic systems in the amount of \$410.00; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Oneida County Board of Supervisors supports changing the fee schedule to charge a \$410.00 fee for the review of an "At-Risk" septic system and shall become effective immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law. WHEREAS, according to the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, over the past decade, the state of Wisconsin has transferred approximately \$1.2 billion from the state's segregated transportation fund to the state's general fund and replaced it with approximately \$800 million in General Obligation (GO) bonds. Thereby, reducing the amount available for transportation purposes by approximately \$400 million; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's practice of transferring money from the segregated transportation fund to the general fund has eroded the public's confidence that the "user fees" they pay through the state gasoline tax and vehicle registration fees will be used for their intended purpose; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's practice of replacing the dollars transferred from the state's segregated transportation fund with GO bonds puts our state in the precarious position of bonding to fund ongoing operations; an

WHEREAS, the Pew Center on the States recently released a report that included Wisconsin as having one of the ten worst budget situations in the country and specifically cited transferring money from the transportation fund to fund ongoing operations as an example of one of the practices that has put Wisconsin in such an untenable position; and

WHEREAS, the debt service for these bonds will have to be paid for out of the state's general fund which hinders its ability to fund other programs like Shared Revenue, Youth Aids, Community Aids and courts in the future; and

WHEREAS, using the states general obligation (GO) bonds in this way has hurt the state's bond rating. A report issued by CNN in 2009 listed Wisconsin as having the second worst GO bond rating in the country; and

WHEREAS, gas tax and vehicle registration fees comprise over 90% of the state's segregated transportation account. Revenues from these two sources have been declining and are inadequate to meet the existing transportation needs in this state; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's transportation infrastructure is a fundamental component in its ability to attract and retain business and produce jobs; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Oneida County deserve the right to have their voices heard on this important issue; and

WHEREAS, providing constitutional protection much like our neighbors in Minnesota, Iowa, Michigan and Ohio already have is the only way to ensure that this practice will not continue;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Oneida County Board of Supervisors that the following question will be put to the voters of Oneida County in an advisory referendum during the November 2010 election:

Should the Wisconsin Constitution be amended to prohibit any further transfers or lapses from the segregated transportation fund? and;
