Re: Veterans Service Office 2019 Annual Report

Attached is the 2019 Annual Report for the Oneida County Veterans Service Office. The amount of benefits our veterans and their families and survivors received last calendar year was almost 9% higher than in 2018.

In 2019, between our daily phone calls, appointments, walk-ins, home visits, and electronic communication (Facebook, email, and texts), we averaged more than 24 veteran contacts each work day. This number does not include the number of people we saw at four different outreach events; however, we do know we had over 200 people attend our Multi-County Veterans Benefits Expoheld on April 26, 2019, at the Rhinelander Army National Guard Armory.

The VA benefits paid to veterans in 2019 reflected on page 1 (minus treatment at VA facilities) illustrates the direct income received by our veterans through their VA benefits was over \$31 million. It's reasonable to assume much of that money was spent right here in Oneida County. This income is beneficial to not only our veterans but the county as well. When a veteran's income is increased through federal dollars, that can mean they need less assistance from the state or county, if they needed it in the first place. It also means more money being spent in our community. The \$15.5 million received in treatment at VA healthcare facilities is beneficial for those reasons, too, but what's most important is many veterans, especially our totally disabled veterans, wouldn't be able to afford health insurance if it weren't for the VA. Having VA healthcare as an option gives them something more valuable than money; it gives them better health, a better quality of life, and often saves lives.

The total cost to operate the Veterans Service Office in 2019 was \$140,176; however, we received a \$10,000 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs which was used toward my salary thus saving the county \$10,000 and reducing our operating cost.

Jason and I always strive to do better for our veterans than we did the year before and once again, we reached that goal in 2019. We are proud to serve those who have served along with their family members and survivors, and we're proud to be doing it in Oneida County!




