Re: Veterans Service Office 2020 Annual Report

Attached is the 2020 Annual Report for the Oneida County Veterans Service Office. The amount of benefits our veterans and their families and survivors received last calendar year was 35% higher than in 2019.

In 2020, between our daily phone calls, appointments, walk-ins, home visits, and electronic communication (Facebook, email, and texts), we averaged more than 19 veteran contacts each work day, which was about 1,300 less than last year, I'm sure due to COVID.

The VA benefits paid to veterans in 2020 reflected on page 1 (minus treatment at VA facilities) illustrates the direct income received by our veterans through their VA benefits was over \$44 million. It's reasonable to assume much of that money was spent right here in Oneida County. This income is beneficial to not only our veterans but the county as well. When a veteran's income is increased through federal dollars, it can mean they need less assistance from the state or county, if they needed it in the first place. It also means more money being spent in our community.

The total cost to operate the Veterans Service Office in 2020 was \$133,878; however, we received a \$10,000 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs which was used toward my salary thus saving the county \$10,000 and reducing our operating cost.

Just like every other county office, COVID-19 affected our office and our veterans. Both the Assistant CVSO and I worked from home for six weeks then furloughed every other week for another 11 weeks. Business was definitely slower during that time but it pretty much got back to normal by the fall. We still continued to do as many phone vs. in-person appointments as we could but some in-person appointments were unavoidable. The best thing to come out of that situation was our office's web page. We worked countless hours putting together something very detailed and easily understood regarding veteran and survivor benefits. We also attached links to numerous VA forms so we could guide our clients to our web page instead of them having to come in to get them. We are extremely proud of the work we did and we invite you to check it out at co.oneida.wi.us/departments/vs/.





Obviously, COVID was the reason we saved \$4,723.67 in non-personnel expenses. Additionally, we were budgeted for \$138,114.00 in personnel expenses but only spent \$126,578.77 for another \$11,535.23 in savings. Presumably, this is because both the CVSO and ACVSO furloughed every other week for several weeks and also because we did not use our Limited Term Employee at all in 2020.

ONEIDA COUNTY DAV VAN

The Veterans Service Office coordinates the DAV van which in 2019, served 124 veterans from five different counties. This service is \underline{free} to Oneida County and \underline{free} to the veterans. If we paid mileage at the VA rate to the Oneida County veterans who used the van, we would pay them \$.415 per mile for an annual total of \$4,764.20. That amount can also be regarded as an annual savings to the county.
