

Burial Eligibility

Burial in a VA national cemetery or state Veterans cemetery is open to all members of the armed forces and Veterans who have met minimum active duty service requirements, as applicable by law and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. Members of the reserve components of the armed forces who die while on active duty under certain circumstances or who die while on training duty are also eligible for burial, as are service members and former service members who were eligible for retired pay at the time of their death. Spouses, minor children and, under certain conditions, dependent unmarried adult children are also eligible for burial even if they predecease the Veteran.



Benefits

Burial benefits include a gravesite in any VA national cemetery with available space, or a VA-funded state/ tribal cemetery; the opening and closing of the grave; grave liner; government headstone or marker; perpetual care of the grave; a burial flag; and Presidential Memorial Certificates at no cost to the family. VA's Veterans Benefits Administration pays a burial and plot allowance for those Veterans eligible by law. For information, please contact the nearest VA Regional Office at 800-827-1000.



The VA National Cemetery Administration honors Veterans and their families with final resting places in national shrines and with lasting tributes that commemorate their service and sacrifice to our Nation.

Arranging Burial

The funeral home or next-of-kin should contact the National Cemetery Scheduling Office to make burial arrangements for Veterans, spouses and/or their eligible dependents. Fax all available military discharge documents to the scheduling office at 866-900-6417 and follow up with a call to 800-535-1117. The scheduling office representatives will assist with the verification process. It may require 48 hours to determine eligibility for burial in a national cemetery.

Pre-Need Determination



VA provides determinations of eligibility for burial in a VA national cemetery prior to the time of need to assist Veterans and their families with end-of-life planning. Interested individuals may submit VA Form 40-10007, Application for Pre-Need Determination of Eligibility for Burial in a VA National Cemetery, along with a copy of supporting documentation of military service such as a DD214, if readily available, by: toll-free fax at 1-855-840-8299 or by mail to the National Cemetery Scheduling Office, P.O. Box 510543, St. Louis, MO 63151. Please do not email applications as it may put personally-identifiableinformation at risk.

Headstones, Markers and Medallíons

VA provides headstones and markers for the graves of eligible Veterans in private and government cemeteries around the world. VA also provides a bronze medallion that can be affixed to an existing privately purchased headstone or marker. The medallion is furnished in lieu of a traditional government headstone or marker.



Presidential Memorial Certíficates

A Presidential Memorial Certificate (PMC) is inscribed with the Veteran's name and bears the President's signature to honor the memory of honorably discharged, deceased Veterans. Intended recipients include next-of- kin and loved ones.

VA provides U.S. flags to drape the caskets of members of the armed forces and eligible Veterans. The flag is given to the next-of-kin. Apply for the flag by completing VA Form 27-2008, Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes. U.S. post offices are the primary issuing point for burial flags. The Department of Defense (DOD) provides military funeral honors. Funeral directors should request this on behalf of the Veterans' family. To learn more, visit www.dmdc.osd.mil/mfh/.

The burial locations of Veterans and their family members in VA national cemeteries, some state Veterans cemeteries and various other military and Department of the Interior cemeteries may be accessed through the Nationwide Gravesite Locator (http:// gravelocator.cem.va.gov) and at gravesite locator kiosks at national cemeteries.
