GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

1. Must be held in a location which is reasonably accessible to the public.
2. Must be open to all members of the public unless the law specifically provides otherwise.

NOTICE REQUIREMENTS:

1. In addition to any requirements set forth below, notice must also be in compliance with any other specific statute.
2. Chief presiding officer or his/her designee must give notice to the official newspaper and to any members of the news media likely to give notice to the public.

MANNER OF NOTICE:

Date, time, place and subject matter, including subject matter to be considered in a closed session, must be provided in a manner and form reasonably likely to apprise members of the public and news media.

TIME FOR NOTICE:

1. Normally, a minimum of 24 hours prior to the commencement of the meeting.
2. No less than 2 hours prior to the meeting if the presiding officer establishes there is good cause that such notice is impossible or impractical.
3. Separate notice for each meeting of the governmental body must be given.

EXEMPTIONS FOR COMMITTEES & SUBUNITS

Legally constituted sub-units of a parent governmental body may conduct a meeting during the recess or immediately after the lawful setting to act or deliberate upon the subject which was the subject of the meeting, provided the presiding officer publicly announces the time, place and subject matter of the sub-unit meeting in advance of the meeting of the parent governmental body.

PROCEDURE FOR GOING INTO CLOSED SESSION:

1. Motion must be made, seconded and carried by roll call majority vote and recorded in the minutes.
2. If motion is carried, chief presiding officer must advise those attending the meeting of the nature of the business to be conducted in the closed session, and the specific statutory exemption under which the closed session is authorized.

SYNOPSIS OF STATUTORY EXEMPTIONS UNDER WHICH CLOSED SESSIONS ARE PERMITTED:

1. Concerning a case which was the subject of a Judicial or quasi-judicial trial before this governmental body. Sec. 19.85(1)(a)
2. Considering dismissal, demotion or discipline of any public employee or the investigation of charges against such person and the taking of formal action on any such matter; provided that the person is given actual notice of any evidentiary hearing which may be held prior to final action being taken and of any meeting at which final action is taken. The person under consideration must be advised of his/her right that the evidentiary hearing be held in open session and the notice of the meeting must state the same. Sec. 19.85(1)(b)
3. Considering employment, promotion, compensation or performance evaluation data of any public employee over which this body has jurisdiction or responsibility. Sec. 19.85(1)(c)
4. Considering strategy for crime detection or prevention. Sec. 19.85(1)(d)
5. Deliberating or negotiating the purchase of public properties, the investing of public funds, or conducting other specified public business whenever competitive or bargaining reasons require a closed session. Sec. 19.85(1)(e)
6. Considering financial, medical, social or personal histories or disciplinary data of specific person, preliminary consideration of specific personnel problems or the investigation of specific charges, which, if discussed in public, would likely have a substantial adverse effect on the reputation of the person referred to in such data. Sec. 19.85(1)(f), except where paragraph 2 applies.
7. Conferring with legal counsel concerning strategy to be adopted by the governmental body with respect to litigation in which it is or is likely to become involved. Sec. 19.85(1)(g)
8. Considering a request for advice from any applicable ethics board. Sec. 19.85(1)(h)

PLEASE REFER TO CURRENT STATUTE SECTION 19.85 FOR FULL TEXT**CLOSED SESSION RESTRICTIONS:**

1. Must convene in open session before going into closed session.
2. May not convene in open session, then convene in closed session and thereafter reconvene in open session within twelve hours unless proper notice of this sequence was given at the same time and in the same manner as the original open meeting.
3. Final approval or ratification of a collective bargaining agreement may not be given in closed session.
4. No business may be taken up at any closed session except that which relates to matters contained in the chief presiding officer's announcement of the closed session.
5. In order for a meeting to be closed under Section 19.85(1)(f) at least one committee member would have to have actual knowledge of information which he or she reasonably believes would be likely to have a substantial adverse effect upon the reputation involved and there must be a probability that such information would be divulged. Thereafter, only that portion of the meeting where such information would be discussed can be closed. The balance of that agenda item must be held in open session.

BALLOTS, VOTES AND RECORDS:

1. Secret ballot is not permitted except for the election of officers of the body or unless otherwise permitted by specific statutes.
2. Except as permitted above, any member may require that the vote of each member be ascertained and recorded.
3. Motions and roll call votes must be preserved in the record and be available for public inspection.

USE OF RECORDING EQUIPMENT:

The meeting may be recorded, filmed, or photographed, provided that it does not interfere with the conduct of the meeting or the rights of the participants.

LEGAL INTERPRETATION:

1. The Wisconsin Attorney General will give advice concerning the applicability or clarification of the Open Meeting Law upon request.
2. The municipal attorney will give advice concerning the applicability or clarification of the Open Meeting Law upon request.

PENALTY:

Upon conviction, any member of a governmental body who knowingly attends a meeting held in violation of Subchapter IV, Chapter 19, Wisconsin Statutes, or who otherwise violates the said law shall be subject to forfeiture of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.00 for each violation.

**BOARD OF HEALTH COMMITTEE
MEETING MINUTES
January 13, 2026**

Call to order: Vice Chair Hess called the meeting to order at 9:00am on the second floor of the Health & ADRC Building, 100 W. Keenan Street, Rhinelander, WI. The meeting was posted in accordance with the Wisconsin Open Meeting Law and the facility is handicap accessible.

Approval of agenda: Motion by Fried/Lopez to approve today’s agenda with the order of items at the Chair’s discretion to move around. All ayes; motion carried.

Minutes of December 9, 2025: Motion by Fried/Lopez to approve the December 9, 2025, Board of Health Committee minutes. All ayes; motion carried.

Public Comment/Communications: None

Beth Stamper – 15 year service award: Conlon presented Stamper with a 15-year service award. She served one year in Social Services and the past 14 years at the Health Department in Reproductive Health. Conlon noted Stamper has demonstrated a strong passion and deep commitment to her program.

Out of State Staff Report – Jenny Chiamulera & Erika Kleinschmidt:

2025 National Deflection & Pre-Arrest Diversion: Chiamulera introduced herself as a Community Health Specialist and also introduced Erika Kleinschmidt, Peer Support Coordinator in Human Services. She mentioned that she, Kleinschmidt, and three representatives from the Rhinelander Police Department, members of the Community Response Team, attended the 2025 International Deflection & Pre-Arrest Diversion Conference in New Orleans in early December. Chiamulera noted that the conference was very beneficial, providing valuable opportunities to network with other communities and learn from peer programs. With several team members attending, the group was able to participate in all available breakout sessions.

Chiamulera noted the first day was spent working with the coordinated community response team, which created space for brainstorming ways to improve systems and identify opportunities for growth. Kleinschmidt shared her takeaways from the breakout trainings related to youth deflection and noted that the team plans to focus more on youth this year. Chiamulera added that the team was able to advance their training and mentioned the possibility of requesting a grant extension. She also noted that they are addressing sustainability issues to determine how the program will continue once the grant ends.

Monthly/Quarterly Reports:

Environmental Health: McKinney introduced herself and provided a recap of the Environmental Health Team's 2025 activities, including facilities and inspections, lab and water testing, and Temporary Event Inspections. She also highlighted new lodging codes set to take effect at the end of January, which will increase nitrate testing by over 500. The team is currently conducting a cost analysis to determine whether to perform nitrate testing in-house rather than sending samples to UW Oshkosh. Discussion followed.

Health Hazards: Deede reviewed 2025 Health Hazards report, highlighting trends identified in quarter 4. Deede mentioned the quality improvement efforts in 2025, reduced case investigation time, despite five more cases than in 2024. A lead investigator improved workflow and efficiency, though variability in case complexity and outcomes highlights the need for ongoing monitoring and process improvement. Discussion followed.

Respiratory Illness:

Conlon reported an increase in Influenza A cases, noting that this season's strain is not a good match for the flu vaccine. Many hospitalizations are occurring among individuals who were not vaccinated. Influenza activity is particularly high in the northern region and continues to rise, even as statewide Influenza A cases begin to decrease. RSV activity remains low.

Conlon explained that surveillance relies on state data, school monitoring, and ESSENCE reports. She also noted that at-home tests are available for both influenza and COVID-19.

Board of Health 2025 Annual Summary: Conlon reviewed the Board of Health's 2025 Annual Summary, which highlighted the Board's activities over the past year.

PFAS Update:

Conlon provided an update from the DNR regarding the expanded PFAS testing and results from a few weeks ago.

Crump noted that PBS will be producing a documentary about the Town of Stella. He asked whether there had been further consideration of forming a countywide PFAS committee, noting that other townships have been reaching out to him for information. It was explained that ongoing litigation is being monitored before any action is taken, and Fried noted that efforts to establish a committee will continue.

Public Health Infrastructure Grant Regional Epidemiologist LTE position: Conlon reviewed the Public Health Infrastructure Grant Regional Epidemiologist LTE position request. Discussion followed.

Motion by Hess/Crump motion to forward the Public Health Infrastructure Grant Regional Epidemiologist LTE position on to executive committee for consideration. All ayes; motion carried.

Conlon reviewed the 2025 budget and the paid invoices report, noting no major concerns at this time. Final, or near-final, numbers are expected to be available for the February meeting. Hess highlighted the presentation of vouchers, purchase orders, and line-item transfers.

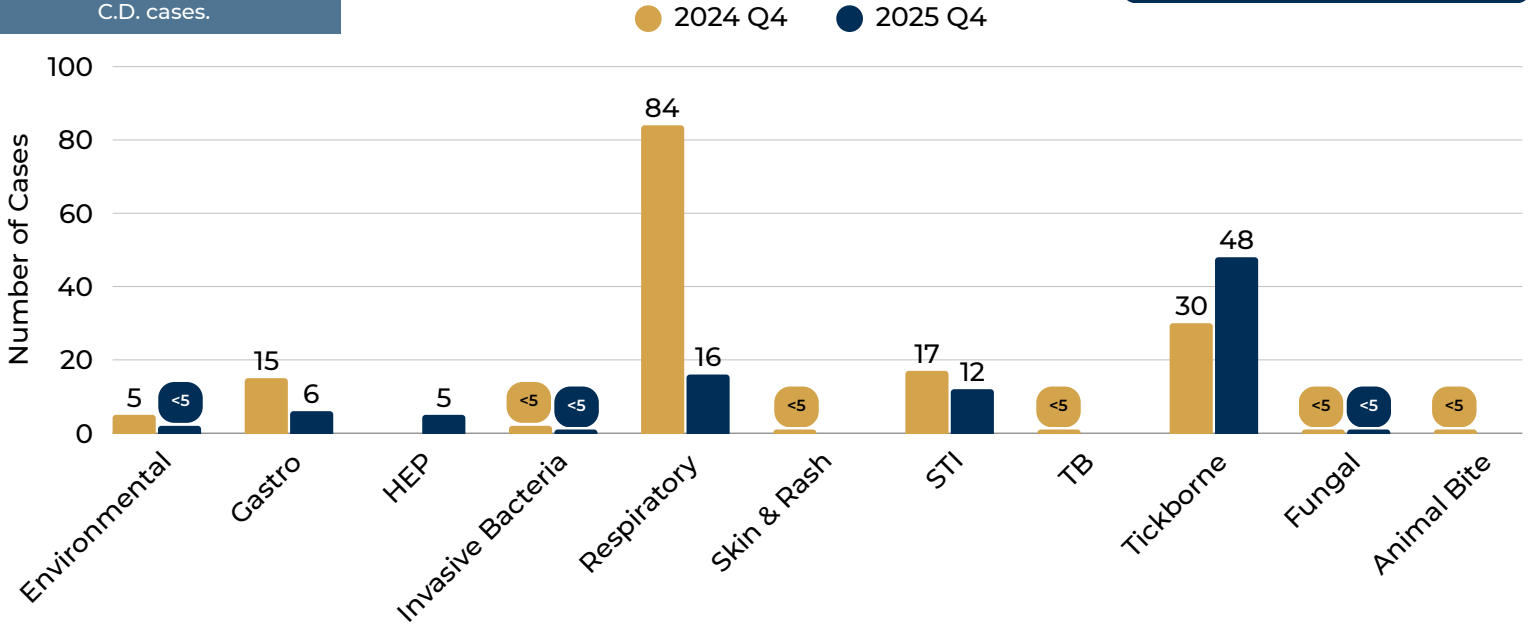

Types of Communicable Diseases in Quarter 4

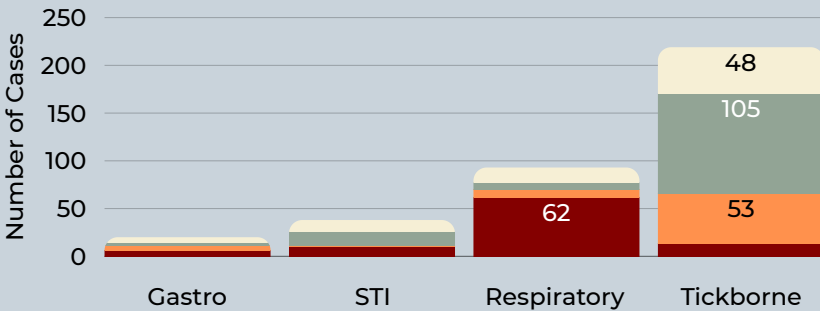

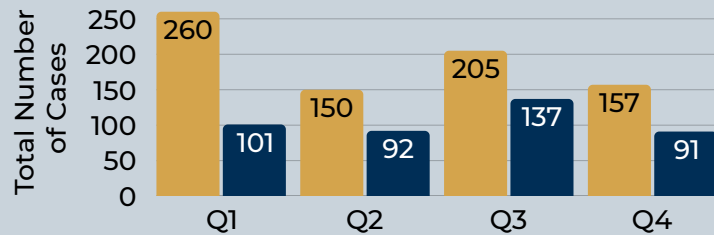
2025 Year to Date C.D. Cases by Quarter

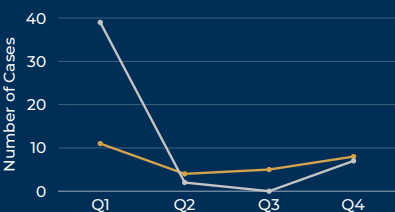
